By its own description, Bryanston - where an impressive 30 per cent of pupils receive fee-support – is an establishment 'not bound by tradition'. There's no formal uniform, and it prides itself on 'looking to the future with boldness, ambition and creativity'. While most students hail from within a 90-minute radius, there's a handful from London, and 12 per cent from overseas. The school has now joined forces with Knighton House Prep - allowing a seamless flow of learning from age three to 18. Spread across 400 acres, Bryanston has a campus feel and, at weekends, teens head into Blandford. Academically, it's on fire, with 50 per cent of A-level grades A*-A in 2021; and parents praise the way every child meets with their tutor one-to-one at least once a week – a system that ensures no one slips through the gaps. There are sporting options for everyone, including training off the Dorset coast for the Bry Solent Swim (a six-kilometre open-water race). Food is universally deemed 'amazing', especially the omelette bar. Maths teacher Mr Calver's passion for knitting has got the whole school hooked: a pupil-led club now sends blankets to South Africa. Plus, there are house plays, fashion shows - and lately, a The Masked Singer-style talent contest.

Canfordians like to 'give things a go' and are renowned for being chatty, bright and engaging. Thirty-five pupils currently benefit from 80 per cent or more bursary funding; and some of the staff are Old Canfordians themselves, with a deep affection for the alma mater. Academically, it more than delivers - 24 places to medical schools and 30 places at Oxbridge in the last three years – and progress continues apace. A new high-tech library opened last year; two new boys' boarding houses have recently been unveiled; plus, a new Sixth Form college is in the works that will feature a hub for careers advice. Clubs include everything from bushcraft to code-breaking; and 20 sports are offered across 250 acres. There's even a thriving fishing club - its record for a salmon caught in the Stour is one that weighed in at over 34lbs. Valuing drama as a unifying force, Canford puts on six major productions every year. The pastoral care is nothing short of excellent. Always aware of pupils' wellbeing, the school's Sleep Programme sees trained 'Sleep Champions' on hand to be consulted, day or night.

The college has partnerships with local schools and is widening access with a raft of bursaries. Head Nicola Huggett says

her secret is 'operating a big school on the principles of a small one', but there's nothing minor about her aspirations, with plans for a centre for innovation and excellence; a new nursery that will open this year; and the inauguration last September of Cheltenham Muscat in Oman. Students are encouraged to chase their dreams - and if there isn't a group for their interest, they'll start one. Case in point: the Investment club, established by tycoons-inthe-making. With 80 per cent of students boarding, their houses are 'true refuges', according to one father, and there's always a sympathetic ear. 'I had bad news, and 10 minutes later my matron was in my room with a mug of delicious hot chocolate and biscuits,' recalls one pupil. Once, when a fire alarm went off during a social, everyone piled outside to dance under the stars and the event went down in history. And herein lies the essence of a Cheltonian: relentless positivity even in the face of adversity.
