Christopher Carey
Portman 1928 – 32

Rank: 2nd Lieutenant
Died: 9th Jan 1942
Aged: 27
Service: Royal Armoured Corps
Resting Place: Canewdon (St Nicholas) Churchyard Essex
Details: One of three WW2 graves Carey went to help an aircraft which crash landed. He was killed on the ground when trying to put out the fire of a crashed bomber in **Wiltshire**.
Christopher is buried at Canewdon Churchyard.
On the 9 January 1942 an Avro Manchester aircraft from 61 Squadron has taken off from its base in Rutland at North Luffenham on a raid to Cherbourg, France. While outbound the starboard engine caught fire and the heavily laden aircraft began to lose height. The pilot was reluctant to jettison the bomb load for fear of injuring people on the ground, but as a precaution he ordered six of his crew to bale out. The two pilots tried to make an emergency landing but failed to see a line of trees and the aircraft crashed 0620 near Tidworth Garrison, Wiltshire, killing them both. Amongst those attending the scene to assist in the rescue operation were local farmers and the crew of the Bulford Camp Military Fire Tender. Whilst tackling the fire, part of the bomb load exploded. The two were pilots killed along with a local farmer and 2nd Lieutenant Christopher Carey.

Ian Thomas Findlay
Connaught House 1938 – 41

“Ian came to Bryanston (where he spent some of the happiest days of his life) a year before war was declared. But he had decided upon his career long before that. He wanted to fly ... He was no bore, he had other interests – music and cricket and languages, but mainly because he was always genuinely interested in the hobbies of other people.”

Details: Memorial booklet says killed in air operation over Adriatic Coast He was killed on the 12th January 1944, whilst flying in Spitfire VIII, JF510 of No 241 Squadron, which was shot down over Yugoslavia during a recce sortie

John Frank Hough Andrews

“John had a great affection for Bryanston, perhaps the more so because he was there in the very early days. He felt an almost paternal pride in the way it has developed.”

Charles Anthony (Tony) Christopher Young
Portman House 1940 – 44

“Everyone liked Tony Young. He was one of the most thorough and cheerful people I have ever known. Whatever obstacles lay in his way, he was ready to work hard to overcome them. It might have been thought that his spelling would prevent him from getting the School Certificate, but it didn't. It might have been thought that his size would prevent him from distinguishing himself athletically, but he made himself a most successful cox. It was typical of him that although the war was over and on medical grounds he could easily have avoided military service, he insisted on doing what he considered to be his duty. His death in accident in Singapore in January 1946 was a great grief to all who knew him.” WSHC

He came to school in its early days and showed himself one of the finest types of Bryanstonians.
